

Thinking Day

Travel Restrictions? What travel restrictions?!

We wanted to make Thinking Day a bit special this year and decided to celebrate in different ways with our Girlguiding sisters around the world. It all started with the idea of sending a postcard.

Since early February, the Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers in Lingfield and South Godstone have been corresponding, via postcards, with Girl Guides in Australia, where all ages groups are called Girl Guides, emails and video messages with Teddies, Brownies and Guides in South Africa and emails and video messages with the Daisies, Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes, Seniors and Ambassadors in the USA.



Then we thought why not go one step further..... and so on Saturday 13th March, 100 girls and leaders flew to Arizona, via the power of Zoom, for a series of meetings with 100 girls and their leaders from Chandler, Arizona.

Starting at 4pm UK time, which was 9am in USA, the Rainbows and Brownies met with Daisies and Brownies. They started by sharing their promises, then stories of Lord Baden-Powell and Juliette Gordon Low. After playing a game showing some of the cultural differences between the two countries, we shared some craft activities and discussed swops. Finally, we finished with the lighting of a Thinking Day candle to honour new friends and to serve as a reminder to ourselves of our shared values and promise. We all learnt that whilst we live thousands of miles apart, we stand for the same thing.

This was followed by the Guides, Junior and Cadette session at 5pm who had a slightly different challenge. We all learnt a lot about the names for everyday items and some of the favourite items of food in each country. They were lucky enough to meet in smaller breakout rooms to chat and make friends. Each country was thrilled to see some of the badges that each other has and for the UK group to find out more about Girl Scout cookies! Finally, the Rangers and Ambassadors met at 6pm and absolutely loved chatting to each other and finding out all the different varieties of candy, cookies, and chips there are! We all realised one thing – Girl Guides are always quick to find snacks!

Many girls are now going to continuing talking to their new friends as a pen-pal or is it email-pal these days?



A multitude of swops and badges are now travelling across the Atlantic both ways so the girls can make the crafts they saw demonstrated and if we are lucky, we hear there may also be some sweet treats to try.

But that is not all ... the leaders are having a coffee meeting on 20th March so that they can get to chat in peace. It also appears that the Guides and Rangers will be hosting a troop from Chandler in 2024 when they hope to travel for real to the UK.

Virtual Residential

For the final part of my Queen's Guide (Outdoor Challenge, Element One), I organised a virtual 18-30 residential with the theme of Brilliant Birds and Wildlife. The virtual residential was an amazing experience – it was the first virtual event I have organised - and it was particularly great to meet other Girlguiding members aged 18-30. Before organising the virtual residential, I scarcely knew anyone in the 18-30 age range within Girlguiding; now, I have a group of new friends.

Seven participants attended from all over England, including from Leeds, Swindon and Somerset, as well as Surrey East. All of the participants were extremely friendly, enthusiastic and helpful. In addition to completing bird themed activities, we shared memories and experiences of Girlguiding, showing badges earned and also different neckers. The virtual residential was a wonderful opportunity and I met a group of nice people.

The main focus of the residential was to complete the 'Big Garden Birdwatch (RSPB)'. We all individually looked for birds for an hour from our gardens or local parks, before meeting up back on Zoom to compare what we had seen.

Over the weekend, we earned three different badges: *Brilliant Birds RSPB, LaSER; Growing Up Wild, RSPB, Winter;* and *Growing Up Wild, Birds.* It was especially nice for Girlguiding members outside the region to have the chance to earn these badges.

I had planned several short Zooms over the weekend, with activities to complete in between them. Notable activities included an evening quiz with a 'Guess the movie - Bird themed' round; identifying birds by listening to bird song; and creating pieces of artwork. The weekend sped past very quickly and we have all agreed that we should arrange another virtual event soon.

Wendy Amer, District Commissioner for Fetcham and Leatherhead Girlguiding said in February: "It was great to see so many girls from the District join us for our Thinking Day celebration. Several girls have joined units in lockdown and are yet to actually meet face to face! Leaders have worked hard to make meetings on Zoom as active and entertaining as possible, with sessions such as a virtual trip to the moon, a bus ride round Europe, guest appearances by llamas and goats, Bollywood dance sessions, computer game coding, escape rooms and making electrical circuits, to name but a few!"

In June a brand new statue was unveiled in Epsom Town Centre of Emily Davison, the suffragette who was tragically killed at the Epsom Derby while trying to place a flag on the king's horse. Priya Watkinson and Anna Champness (Rosebery Head Girls and Girlguiding Young Leaders) unveiled the statue and gave a very moving speech and Division Commissioner Mary Zoeller was privileged to represent Girlguiding at the event and meet the statue's sculptor Christine Charlesworth at the official unveiling.

To celebrate the new statue Epsom Division has launched a Town Challenge suitable for all ages. This circular walk, taking in points of local history, starts at the statue in the Market Place and takes about an hour to complete. There is a special limited edition badge and profits from the badges will go back to Division. Little Acres Campsite




Anyone who has visited Epsom Division's Little Acres campsite in Horton Country Park will have noticed a few additional features have appeared over the past few weeks!


GIRLGUIDING RECRUITMENT DRIVE.




1st Effingham Brownies

They have also made golf sticks and holes for the It's a Hole in One UMA.









1st Ashtead Brownies





The new programme for Guides (aged 10-14) was introduced in 2018 and is designed around six themes to encourage girls to take on a broad range of challenges and activities. To achieve a Gold award a Guide needs to actively participate in all aspects of the programme, complete interest badges at home and undertake an adventure.

Amongst other activities (many on Zoom), between them the four girls have developed their camping and first aid skills, made confectionery and discovered how to fix items like a bicycle. They have also learnt forensic skills and how to vlog!

The Gold Award "adventure" was even more challenging than usual, with all the restrictions caused by Covid-19. Last September, the girls, who were already in a school group bubble, organised a hike along the South Downs Way. They planned their route, taking all the additional measures required to safely navigate the pandemic, as well as the footpaths.

14 year old Olivia is delighted to complete her Gold Award in such challenging circumstances. She said: "I enjoyed spending time with my friends doing the different challenges, even if it was on Zoom! I was so happy that we still managed to do our expedition despite the pandemic, and we made lots of memories. We walked a really, really long way, but with plenty of snack and photo stops it was one to remember. I even got to practise my first aid when my friend twisted her ankle – thankfully she was fine!"
