

Leadership Development Transition

I've completed my modules. What else do I need to do?

That's great you have completed the modules. You will also need to have a valid first aid certificate and safe space levels required for your role. Many of you will be aware that the old style leadership development programme will cease on the 30th September 2023. This means that you have until that date to get everything completed. Below Janet Coninx, our county leadership coordinator, has answered some of the more frequently asked questions she has been asked.

My first aid has expired. Do I have to renew it?

Yes - you will need a valid first aid certificate before you can be signed off. To find out more check in at the county website for trainings.

I want to move sections. Do I still need to complete module 1?

Yes. Please complete module 1. The checklist is available on the Girlguiding website and is signed off by your district or division commissioner. Once completed, please send the approval to me so that I can update your learning record. Email: Iqsurreyeast@gmail.com.

I haven't had my mentor observation yet - is it too late?

No, you can arrange your mentor observation at any time but it must be completed before the 30th September.

I'm not going to be able to complete the scheme before the 30th September. Can I change to the new scheme?

Yes, you can transfer to the new scheme at any time. Just let me know by emailing lqsurreyeast@gmail.com and I'll do the rest.

I haven't completed module 4. Is it too late?

No - you have until the 30th September to complete this - contact me by emailing lqsurresyeast@gmail.com to make arrangements to have this completed.

We were absolutely thrilled to hear that Mary Zoeller was recognised for her contribution to guiding in Surrey East and was crowned a Coronation Champion. Mary celebrated with her brownies – 1st Ewell Village (St Mary's) and went to Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle.

This followed a call out to the nation to nominate their volunteer heroes. Almost 5000 entries were received, with nominations made for individuals aged 14 up to 103. Mary impressed judges with her volunteering work for Girlguiding and other local charities. For Girlguiding, she runs a local Brownie unit, as well as being the Epsom division commissioner and assistant county commissioner.

Commenting on becoming a Coronation Champion, Mary said: "It's an honour to be named a Coronation Champion. In Girlguiding, we all work hard to make a difference to girls and young women's lives and it's wonderful when our volunteering efforts are recognised."

Mary Zoeller has been recognised by Their Majesties The King and The Queen Consort as part of the official Coronation celebrations in conjunction with Royal Voluntary Service.



Catherine Johnstone CBE, Chief Executive of Royal Voluntary Service said: "We were completely blown away by the response to the Community Champions Awards and the huge volume of amazing nominees put forward. Our judges had a tough job selecting just 500 Champions from an array of thousands of inspirational individuals, who all deserve to be recognised and commended."

The Big Help Out





I arrived after lunch and eventually met up with Jooles, LASER deputy chief commissioner. After a while, three more members joined us. We were briefed with the Abbeys' own volunteers and took up our positions along the path leading to the west door of the Abbey.

Once all the invitees, some in national costumes, were seated, we watched a few VIP and royals arrive. We then took our seats in the Abbey in the transepts some way back from the king. The commonwealth flags were paraded and some of the flag bearers wore national costumes, which were very colourful.



Apart from the service and the choir of Westminster Abbey singing,, the nations of the Commonwealth were represented pieces of music:. Africa was represented by the Rwanda National Ballet; the Pacific by Ngati Ranana London Maori Club; Asia by Nuwan Hugh Perera and Roshani Abbey; Europe by The Amalgamation Choir; and Caribbean and the Americas by YolanDa Brown.



After the service, we meet up with several other volunteers, who had been inside all day helping. We also saw Amanda, LASER's chief commissioner, who gave us all her personal LASER badge. She had been to the service representing Girlquiding.

I had a wonderful day and made a lot of memories. Thank you Girlguiding!






1st Hawthorns Rainbows
